<u>Commissions & Initiatives Focus</u> Aerospace Commission

The American Legion's Aerospace Commission is a vital component of the organization's broader National Security pillar, dedicated to advocating for and promoting advancements in military and commercial aerospace technologies and programs, including space exploration and research.



Historical Context: The American Legion recognized the critical importance of airpower for national defense from its very inception following World War I. Veterans of that conflict witnessed firsthand how aviation transformed warfare and were determined that the United States should not fall behind in this crucial area. Despite initial governmental budget cuts to aviation units after WWI, the American Legion actively lobbied to build aviation capabilities. When direct military lobbying proved difficult due to resistance from traditional military branches, the Legion pivoted to supporting civilian aviation infrastructure, understanding its crucial role in wartime readiness.

In 1922, the national convention reorganized its committees, establishing the national Aeronautics Committee under the National Security Commission. This committee, and its modern iteration, the Aerospace Commission, has historically worked on:

- Promote civilian air activities.
- Advocate for aerospace research.
- Support the expansion of airfields and airmail services.
- Change public perception of aviation from a dangerous pursuit to a reliable mode of transportation.

Purpose and Responsibilities: Today, the Aerospace Commission's purposes include:

- Advancement of Technologies: Considering and projecting the advancement of military and commercial aerospace technologies and programs, including space exploration and research.
- National Security: Making recommendations to ensure the U.S. armed forces possess sufficient numbers, quality training, and modern equipment to counter strategic threats. This includes reviewing budgets of the National Guard and Reserve components.
- **Policy Recommendations:** Advising on policies related to sufficient personnel, quality training, modern equipment, and intelligence sharing concerning national security, terrorist activity, and strategic threats.
- Commercialization of Space: With the increasing commercialization of space, the commission's focus also extends to

astronautics requirements in the civilian sector.

The California American Legion Aerospace Commission, for instance, actively works on:

- Promoting civilian air activities and aerospace research.
- Reporting on innovative technologies affecting the nation.
- Helping to set policy through resolutions and community action.
- Engaging in activities such as drone training classes for members to explore advances in drone technology and fostering connections between Legionnaires and younger veterans through initiatives like gaming.
- Archiving and documenting the history of California's legacy in aerospace and the Legion's support for it.

In essence, the Aerospace Commission plays a crucial role in ensuring that the United States maintains its leadership in aviation and space, advocating for robust military capabilities, supporting technological advancements, and promoting aerospace education and opportunities within the veteran community.

AMERICAN LEGION TESTIFIES TWICE ON KEY VETERAN LEGISLATION

American Legion voices support for shielding veterans from fraud and human errors, holding



VA staff accountable and more.

American Legion representatives testified twice June 11 on Capitol Hill on behalf of the nation's veterans, servicemembers and their families.

American Legion Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Director Cole Lyle expressed the organization's support for a series of bills under consideration by the House Veterans Affairs Committee's (HVAC) Oversight & Investigations Subcommittee.

Among the bills under consideration that the Legion supports:

• H.R. 984, which would amend title 38, United States Code, to direct the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to provide timely equitable relief to an individual who suffers a loss based on an administrative error by the Secretary, and for other purposes. "With the implementation of the PACT Act and record volume of claims submitted, the risk of human error has grown," Lyle said. "Veterans should not bear the financial or psychological burden of mistakes beyond their control."

• **H.R. 1663,** Veterans Scam and Fraud Evasion (VSAFE) Act of 2025. Veterans are 40% more likely to fall victim to scams, Lyle noted.

• H.R. 3185, Personnel Integrity in Veterans Affairs Act of 2025. "This legislation rightly balances due process with the need to maintain trust in the VA workforce," he said. "We must hold ourselves to the same standards of honor and integrity we expect from those we serve."

• H.R. 3482, Veterans Community Care Scheduling Improvement Act.

• H.R. 3494, VA Hospital Inventory Management System Authorization Act.

In conclusion, Lyle told the subcommittee, "Our veterans do not ask for special treatment. They only ask for the care and benefit they earned delivered with competence, integrity, and compassion. The bills under discussion today move us closer to that standard."

Also on June 11, American Legion Senior Policy Associate Andrew Petrie testified before the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Economic Opportunity on pending legislation affecting education, financial stability and housing for servicemembers, veterans and their families. <u>Among the bills under consideration</u> that the Legion supports:

• **H.R. 1965:** Veteran Education Assistance Adjustment Act, which under the Post-9/11 Educational Assistance Program would increase the yearly book and supplies stipend for veteran students from \$1,00 to \$1,400.

• **DRAFT:** Expanding Access for Online Veteran Students Act, which would increase the monthly



housing stipend under the Post9/11 Educational Assistance Program for individuals who pursue programs of education solely through distance learning on more than a half-time basis.

• H.R. 2791: To amend title 38, United States Code, this legislation would increase the maximum amount of Department of Veterans Affairs Home Loan Guaranty entitlement from 25 percent to 150 percent to enable veterans to achieve homeownership and expand access to stable housing.

• **DRAFT:** To amend title 38, United States Code, to expand eligibility for homelessness benefits to ensure that servicemembers who were discharged under other than honorable conditions, excluding those separated by reason of a dishonorable discharge or General Court Martial sentencing, are included and not excluded from lifesaving assistance.

Homeland Security & Emergency Preparedness

As part of our National Security pillar, we encourage Posts to consider community emergency preparedness initiatives. Partnering with local first responders and creating awareness programs can significantly contribute to the safety and resilience of our towns.

ABOUT THE DEPARTMENT OF CALIFORNIA

In 1919, many American Legion departments across the United States were holding conventions for the very first time. The Department of California held its first organizational gathering at Post 1 in San Francisco on October 10-12, 1919, where H. G. Mathewson was chosen as the first Department Commander. A year later, the first official Department Convention was held in San Diego on August 23-26, 1920, with David P. Barrow (Berkeley Post 7), elected as the second Department Commander.

Focusing on service to veterans and their families, the Legion evolved from a group of war-weary veterans of World War I into one of the most influential non-partisan and veteran, non-profit organizations in America.

The state headquarters was located at the Veterans War Memorial Building on Van Ness Avenue, across the street from San Francisco City Hall. The building is under the administration of the American Legion War Memorial Commission, <u>https:// alwmcsf.org/</u>. But in 2014, when the headquarters rent was raised from \$1 a year to \$2,500 a month, the Department decided to look for a new home.

As it was in 1919 and continues to the present day, California has the largest veteran population of any state in the United States, at approximately 1.8 million veterans (as of 2022). San Francisco was our headquarters until 2015 and was home to the first American Legion post in California. That post was named as American Legion San Francisco Post 1 (within District 8) and was also located in the Veterans Memorial building, but now meets at the First Lutheran Church on 2nd Avenue SW.

In 2015, after approval from a majority of the state Legion membership, the Department of California bought an 8,000 square foot former bank building in Sanger, CA, sixteen miles east of Fresno (Janet Wilson Department Commander).

In March of 2015, the Department of California headquarters officially moved to Central California. Conveniently located in downtown Sanger. Our new headquarters has ample parking and provides offices for the Department Commander, the Department Adjutant, meeting rooms, storage for records, as well as offices for our administration and support staff.
